



## Kelcy Warren

Kelcy Warren has been a leader in the energy industry for more than 40 years. A native Texan, Warren was born and raised in White Oak, and is a graduate of the University of Texas at Arlington where he earned a degree in civil engineering.

Warren co-founded Dallas-based Energy Transfer in 1996 as a small intrastate natural gas pipeline operator with about 200 miles of pipe and 20 employees. Today, Warren serves as Executive Chairman of one of the country's largest and most diversified portfolio of publicly traded energy partnerships, which includes both Energy Transfer LP and Sunoco LP. Energy Transfer also owns Sun Oil, where Warren's father worked for decades.

Energy Transfer's strategically positioned assets in all major U.S. production basins include more than 90,000 miles of pipelines traversing 38 states and Canada with international office locations in Beijing and Calgary. Core business operations include the gathering, treating, processing, and transporting of natural gas, natural gas liquids, refined products and crude oil. Energy Transfer also owns some of the largest terminalling and storage facilities along the Gulf Coast and in the Northeast.

Warren has been recognized by numerous energy and business organizations for his contributions to the industry. He is honored to be a member of the Horatio Alger Association of Distinguished Americans and a 2020 Laureate in the Dallas Business Hall of Fame presented by Junior Achievement of Dallas. He is also a member of the Texas Business Hall of Fame, the Ammys Hall of Fame and a recipient of the Hanlon Award presented by the Gas Processors Association.

Warren is a dedicated philanthropist and regularly supports educational institutions from grade school through university levels, medical institutions and children's organizations including the MD Anderson Cancer Center and the March of Dimes, among others. He is also a supporter of the Bush Foundation.

Warren serves on the board of the Woodall Rodgers Park Foundation and was appointed by Governor Greg Abbott to serve on the University of Texas System Board of Regents through 2025. He was also appointed to the Kennedy Center Board of Trustees in 2019.
